

British Florida Historical Resources

The British time period in East Florida occurred from 1763 to 1784. Unfortunately, there is very little research on this time period due to the deliberate destruction of resources by the British and loss of many primary sources when they evacuated during the Second Spanish time period.

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British Timeline of Events:

1763: The 1763 treaty of Paris is signed to end the Seven years' War, where Great Britain officially sequesters Florida from Spain in exchange for Havana, Cuba.

1763, July 20: Captain John Hedges and four companies of Infantry take formal control and raise the British flag.

1764: Governor James Grant arrives in East Florida and develops the colony.

1765: John Bartram is appointed as “His Majesty’s Botanist for North America.”

1768: Dr. Andrew Turnbull establishes his New Smyrna colony, and the Minorcan history in Florida begins.

1774: Governor Patrick Tonyn takes control of East Florida.

1775: American Revolution begins April 1775 with the Battle of Lexington.

1777: Dr. Turnbull’s colony fails, and he flees back to England, leaving over one thousand Minorcans to seek shelter in St. Augustine; The East Florida Rangers militia is created by Governor Tonyn.

1778: The Loyalists begin to leave their homes in North Carolina.

1783: The American Revolution comes to an end September 3, 1783 when representatives of the United States, Great Britain, France, and Spain sign the Treaty of Paris. The signing signified America’s status as a free nation. Britain officially recognizes the independence of the thirteen colonies, and the boundaries of the new republic were agreed upon.

1784: The British colonists officially leave Florida, and the Second Spanish time period begins.

Frequently Asked Questions:

1. What resources does the SAHSRL possess on the British time period?

St. Augustine was the capital of the British East Florida Colony and the SAHSRL holds mostly resources on East Florida. However, due to the loss of many documents from this time period, there are few primary sources available. The SAHSRL *does not* possess many typical resources such as Anglican Church records, land grants (other than what was mentioned in De Brahm's report and Loyalist land claims), or populations records prior to 1783.

2. What was Florida like under British rule?

Florida was divided into two separate colonies during British rule by the Apalachicola River. Most of Florida today was the colony named "British East Florida", while the Panhandle and parts of Mississippi, Alabama, and Louisiana were called "British West Florida".

3. What is a Loyalist?

A Loyalist lived in the British colonies and remained loyal to the British government during the American Revolution. When the thirteen states revolted, many of the southern Loyalists fled to East Florida, as it was not involved in the war. Therefore, it was referred to as a "Loyalist safe haven".

4. Where can I find resources on the British West Florida Colony?

The university of West Florida in Pensacola (which was the capital of British West Florida) hold most resources on the West Florida colony. Some research libraries in Alabama, Mississippi, and Louisiana may also hold resources since the colony stretched across those states.

5. Why does the start date of this time period vary?

Some resources cite the British time period in Florida starting in 1763, as that was then the Treaty of Paris was signed, officially giving Florida to the British. However, Governor James Grant arrived in East Florida and developed the colony in 1764, which some resources use as a more accurate start date of the time period.
